NOTES: Retention is an important metric indicating that a student is persisting toward their certificate or degree. The rates of students still enrolled in year two reflects the percent of students who neither received an award nor transferred out and who were enrolled at the same college at any time within the second academic year.

Due to the nature of the population it serves, Ingram State Technical College is not included in this report. Additionally, ISTC does not participate in the National Student Clearinghouse Post-Secondary Data Partnership, so comparable data is not available.

The **MAIN COHORT** includes “all first-time students who entered the institution for the first time post high school completion and are enrolled in credit or developmental education classes in the fall term.”
