NOTES: Public universities are sanctioned by the state to serve a particular purpose. Universities that have less selective admission policies and serve a greater number of students requiring financial aid tend to have lower retention and graduation rates. Data were collected on these students, who at entry of the cohort, were awarded a Pell Grant and students who were awarded a Subsidized Stafford loan, but did not receive a Pell Grant. Graduation rates are the Student Right-to-Know rates.

Graduation rates are defined as the total number of individuals from a given cohort of full-time, first-time degree/certificate-seeking undergraduates who completed a degree or certificate within a given percent of normal time to complete all requirements of the degree or certificate program; divided by the total number of students in the cohort of full-time, first-time degree/certificate-seeking undergraduates minus any allowable exclusions, disaggregated by FINANCIAL AID TYPE.

Athens State University is an upper division institution that does not accept any freshmen students and therefore is not included in this report.
