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3	To create the Students' Right to Know Act of 2023; to
4	require the Alabama Commission on Higher Education to collect
5	data and create an interactive online tool for students for
6	use in making informed decisions relating to education and
7	professions; and to require the commission and Workforce
8	Development Division of the Department of Commerce to share
9	data and information as necessary to comply with this act.
10	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
11	Section 1. This act shall be known and may be cited as
12	the Students' Right to Know Act of 2023.
13	Section 2. This act requires the Alabama Commission on
14	Higher Education to provide information to students to allow
15	those students to make informed decisions about their
16	education and professional future.
17	Section 3. As used in this act, the following terms
18	shall have the following meanings:
19	(1) COMMISSION. The Alabama Commission on Higher
20	Education.
21	(2) DIVISION. The Workforce Development Division of the
22	Department of Commerce that administers or oversees the
23	state's workforce programs, state job board, or any type of
24	workforce program that receives funding from the United States
25	Department of Labor.
26	Section 4. The commission shall collect and compile all
27	of the following information on an annual basis:
28	(1) The 50 most in-demand jobs in the state and their

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29 corresponding starting salaries and education level requirements. 30 31 (2) The average cost for all colleges and universities 32 in the state. 33 (3) The average monthly student loan payment for 34 individuals attending colleges and universities in the state, 35 by institution. 36 (4) The average three-year student loan default rate 37 for all colleges and universities in the state. 38 (5) The average total student loan debt for graduates 39 of colleges and universities, for two-year, four-year, and 40 graduate programs. 41 (6) The average four-year graduation rate for all 42 universities in the state. 43 (7) The average graduation rate for all community colleges in the state. 44 45 (8) The completion rates for apprenticeship programs, 46 high school credential programs, and career and technical 47 education programs. 48 (9) The average salary one year after graduation by 49 college or university major. 50 (10) The average salary one year after completion of an 51 apprenticeship program, high school credential program, or 52 career and technical education program. 53 (11) The base pay for newly enlisted service members. 54 Section 5. (a) The commission shall create an interactive online tool, known as the Student Horizon 55 56 Database, to publish and provide to individuals information

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including, but not limited to, the following: 57 58 (1) The 50 most popular education programs in colleges, 59 universities, and career and technical education programs in the state based on information collected in Section 4. 60 61 (2) A searchable database capable of comparing all of 62 the following based on users' selections: 63 a. Average annual cost, including average financial 64 assistance. 65 b. Average annual cost, not including any financial 66 assistance. 67 c. Graduation rate. 68 d. Average salary after attending, but not completing, 69 a college or university program. 70 e. Average salary for individuals completing one of the 71 five most popular majors at a college or university. f. Full-time enrollment. 72 73 g. Percentage of students not in default of student 74 loans. 75 h. Average total debt after graduation. 76 i. Percentage of students receiving federal loans. 77 j. Average monthly student loan payments for graduates. 78 k. Average monthly student loan payments for 79 nongraduates. 80 1. Percentage of students who return after their first 81 year. 82 m. Graduation, withdrawal, transfer, and current 83 enrollment rates for students within eight semesters after 34 enrollment.



85 (b) The database shall allow students to have the 86 option of selecting a specific major or course of study at a 87 specific institution, and be able to reasonably identify all 88 of the information referenced in this section. 89 Section 6. On or before October 31, 2024, and each 90 October thereafter, the commission shall publish and make 91 available to high school students a Student Graduate Horizon Scorecard that shall contain all of the following data, 92 93 collected and aggregated pursuant to this act: 94 (1) The 50 highest paying four-year degrees. 95 (2) The 20 highest paying career and technical 96 education and certificate programs. 97 (3) The 25 most in-demand jobs in the state and their 98 corresponding starting salaries and education requirements. 99 (4) The base pay, benefits, and average signing bonus 100 for enlistment in the military, along with the necessary Armed 101 Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) score by the 102 military branch. 103 Section 7. The commission shall issue an annual report 104 to the Legislature outlining the effectiveness of colleges, 105 universities, or any other postsecondary education 106 institutions accepting public funding in aligning their 107 curricula or programs with the state job market, including the 108 degree to which they contribute to filling the most in-demand

109 jobs in the state.

Section 8. The commission and the division shall enter into a memorandum of understanding to share any data or information necessary to comply with this act. . .



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113	Section 9. To satisfy the requirements of this act, the
114	commission may do either of the following:
115	(1) Utilize and incorporate preexisting databases, such
116	as the United States College Scorecard, administered by the
117	federal department of education, as well as any other data
118	sets available to the commission.
119	(2) Compel colleges and universities to collect and
120	provide information or data as necessary.
121	Section 10. The commission shall adopt any necessary
122	rules to implement this act.
123	Section 11. This act shall become effective January 1,
124	2024, following its passage and approval by the Governor, or
125	its otherwise becoming law.
