SB129

5 To make appropriations for the support, maintenance 6 and development of public education in Alabama, for debt 7 service, and for capital outlay for the fiscal year ending 8 September 30, 2018.

9 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

10 Section 1. There is hereby appropriated for the support of public education in Alabama for the fiscal year 11 ending September 30, 2018, for debt service, and for capital 12 13 outlay to be paid out of funds specified in subsection (a) of 14 Section 2 of this act, the amounts specified in subsections 15 (a), (b), (c), (d), and (e) of Section 3 of this act. For the 16 purpose specified in subsection (b) of Section 2 of this act, 17 amounts are shown by programmatic area and the total for all programs is shown so as to include estimated sources of funds 18 19 other than those listed in subsection (a) of Section 2 of this 20 act. For the purpose of this act, "ETF" shall mean the Education Trust Fund and "Federal and Local Funds" shall mean 21 22 all gifts, grants, contributions, or entitlements, including 23 grants by the Congress of the United States, municipalities or 24 counties.

1 Section 2. (a) The appropriations provided for in 2 this act shall be paid from funds in the State Treasury to the 3 credit of the Education Trust Fund, Alabama Peace Officers' 4 Standards and Training Fund, Impaired Drivers Trust Fund, 5 Driver Education and Training Fund, Special Education 6 Catastrophic Fund, Public School Fund and other listed funds 7 and are hereby made for the support of public education in 8 Alabama for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2018, and the 9 appropriations herein made shall be subject to the provisions, 10 terms, conditions and limitations of the Budget and Financial 11 Control Act (Code of Alabama 1975, Sections 41-4-80 et seq.), the provisions of the Budget Management Act of 1976 (Code of 12 13 Alabama 1975, Sections 41-19-1 et seq.), and shall be in the amounts hereinafter specified. 14

(b) Amounts shown hereinunder the columns "Earmarked 15 Funds" and "Appropriation Total" are as set forth for the 16 17 purpose of establishing amounts estimated to be available by 18 programmatic area from sources other than those listed in subsection (a) of this Section 2, in order, upon consideration 19 of such other funds so estimated to be available, to promote 20 21 the accountability for an efficient use of funds available, and the same are hereby appropriated by the Legislature. 22 23 Provided, however, that regardless of the ending date of any pay period which has been or may be established by the 24 Legislature for the payment of salaries of state employees, 25

For "Classroom Instructional Support," the uniform amounts used in determining the Foundation Program allowance for classroom instructional support shall be: (1) textbooks or digital resources at \$54.52 per pupil in average daily membership during the first 20 scholastic days after Labor Day of the preceding school year; (2) classroom materials and supplies at \$421.51 per unit earned in the Foundation Program; (3) technology at \$211.51 per unit earned in the Foundation Program; (4) professional development at \$77.55 per unit earned in the Foundation Program; and (5) library enhancement at \$30.44 per unit earned in the Foundation Program. Funds allocated for instructional support units to meet Advanced Education standards may be used for principals, assistant principals, counselors, and librarians as calculated by the State Department of Education and assigned to the schools where such units are earned. An instructional support unit earned for a principal shall be increased by .31 for elementary schools, .35 for middle schools, and .45 for secondary schools and unit schools. An instructional support unit earned for an assistant principal shall be increased by .10 for elementary schools, middle schools, secondary schools and unit schools. An instructional support unit earned for a counselor shall be increased by .03 for secondary schools and unit schools. The budgeting and expenditure of funds in the Foundation Program at the local level shall be determined and made by the local board of education in accordance with rules and regulations of the State Board of Education and all laws governing such school budgets and expenditures.

22 Section 4. In addition to all other appropriations 23 made in this act, there is hereby appropriated from the 24 Education Trust Fund for the fiscal year ending September 30, 25 2018, as a first priority, conditioned on the estimated 26 appropriation to the Department of Veterans' Affairs Student 27 Financial Aid Program being less than \$91,544,687, the amounts 28 as follows to total the difference between the estimated and

1 actual appropriation to the Department of Veterans' Affairs 2 Student Financial Aid Program: (1) to Other Current Expense in 3 the Foundation Program the amount of \$7,000,000, and (2) to 4 the institutions of higher education on a pro rata basis, 5 based on the FY 2018 Education Trust Fund Operations and 6 Maintenance appropriations to institutions of higher 7 education, any balance in the difference between the estimated 8 and actual appropriation to the Department of Veterans' 9 Affairs Student Financial Aid Program and the appropriation in 10 (1) above.

11 Section 5. In addition to the appropriations herein 12 made, all gifts, grants, contributions, insurance proceeds or 13 entitlements, in excess of the amount carried in this act, 14 including grants by the Congress of the United States, 15 municipalities or counties, to any department, division, 16 board, bureau, commission, agency, institution, office or 17 officer of the State of Alabama are hereby appropriated and, in the event the same are recurring, are reappropriated to 18 19 such department, division, board, bureau, commission, agency, 20 institution, office or officer to be used only for the purpose or purposes for which the grant or contribution was or shall 21 22 be made. Further, all state, county, municipal and educational entities are authorized to disburse such sums as deemed 23 necessary by mutual agreement between said entities and the 24 25 State of Alabama, Department of Examiners of Public Accounts

to partially defray the cost of auditing services performed by said agency. All such sums are hereby appropriated and reappropriated if necessary to the Department of Examiners of Public Accounts for audit services, to be expended through the fund established by Section 41-5-24, Code of Alabama 1975.

6 Section 6. The State Superintendent of Education 7 shall make requisitions to the State Comptroller in favor of the proper beneficiary in accordance with the law and rules 8 9 and regulations governing the expenditure or disbursement of 10 any and all funds appropriated to the State Department of 11 Education and/or the State Board of Education in this act, whereupon the Comptroller shall issue his warrant therefor. 12 All other appropriations in this act shall be paid after 13 proper requisitions are made to the State Comptroller in the 14 manner now provided by law. 15

16 Section 7. Nothing in this act shall be construed to affect or repeal any law authorizing or permitting any 17 college, school or other education or eleemosynary institution 18 of the State to receive, collect or disburse any fees, 19 tuitions, charges, sales, endowments, trusts or income 20 21 therefrom, which are now or may hereafter be authorized to receive, collect or disburse. The receiving college, school or 22 institution shall further maintain separate accounts for such 23 receipts or shall maintain a system of accounting which will 24

show a cash flow of such receipts received under the provision of this appropriation.

3 Section 8. The appropriations made herein to the departments, boards, offices, commissions, and agencies 4 include the amounts necessary and said departments, boards, 5 offices, commissions, and agencies are hereby directed to make 6 7 the transfer of funds to the State Personnel Department in the 8 amounts enumerated in the general appropriations act for the 9 fiscal year ending September 30, 2018. All agencies and 10 institutions enumerated in this act that receive services from 11 other governmental agencies enumerated in this act or the 12 general appropriations act shall make full payment in a timely 13 manner (as determined by the Department of Finance) for such 14 services.

Section 9. All encumbered balances of a previous 15 16 fiscal year appropriation other than the exclusions authorized by the Code of Alabama 1975, Section 41-4-93, shall lapse no 17 18 later than September 30 of the fiscal year immediately following the fiscal year for which the appropriation was made 19 and shall revert to the credit of the Education Trust Fund or 20 earmarked fund from which the appropriation or appropriations 21 22 were made.

23 Section 10. Upon certification to the Director of 24 Finance by the State Attorney General that a federal court has 25 ordered the State of Alabama to pay claims, attorney fees, or

1 other costs relating to said court order, funds are hereby 2 appropriated to the affected department, board, bureau, or 3 commission in the amount necessary to satisfy that court 4 order. Such appropriations are in addition to any other 5 appropriation heretofore or hereafter made in this 6 appropriation act. Such appropriations are conditioned upon 7 the availability of funds and a determination by the Director 8 of Finance that other current appropriations are not available 9 for court-ordered payments.

10 Section 11. For FY 2018, local boards of education 11 may exercise flexibility among line item expenditures, not to 12 create a reduction of earned teacher units and/or local board 13 of education support personnel.

14 Section 12. The State Superintendent of Education 15 may approve a request by a local board of education for 16 redirecting Other Current Expense funds designated for 17 pass-through calculations to their local Child Nutrition 18 Program if the redirected funds do not prevent the Child 19 Nutrition Program of that local board of education from 20 maintaining a one-month fund balance.

Section 13. The appropriations made herein to the departments, boards, offices, commissions and agencies include the amounts necessary to pay the State Employees' Insurance Board (SEIB). The SEIB rate shall be \$930 per month for each full-time employee for the fiscal year ending September 30,

2018. The State Employees' Insurance Board will adjust the
 insurance program wherever appropriate to maintain the
 aforementioned fixed rate.

4 Section 14. Notwithstanding any other provisions of 5 this act or any other act, any amount from appropriations for 6 the fiscal year ending September 30, 2017 to the various state 7 agencies and institutions in this act, except appropriations 8 from the Education Trust Fund, which are unexpended and 9 reverted on September 30, 2017 are hereby reappropriated to 10 the respective state agencies, offices and institutions for 11 the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2017.

12 Section 15. The At-Risk and High Hopes 13 appropriations made to the State Department of Education shall 14 be expended as follows: 40% shall be at the discretion of the 15 State Superintendent of Education and 60% shall be awarded in 16 the form of grants to school systems/entities for activities or programs designed to enhance outcomes for at-risk students. 17 In the awarding of grants, preference will be given to 18 undertakings that will directly impact student achievement and 19 20 improve performance on state assessments to include 21 remediation for students, after-school and tutorial programs, 22 career/technical programs, character education, enrichment 23 activities, programs that enhance reading and mathematics 24 abilities in students, activities that increase grade-to-grade

1 promotion, career and college readiness and early warning and 2 prevention programs.

3 In an effort to provide the best and most efficient 4 implementation for intervention and innovation in schools, 5 administration of the grant awards shall be assigned to the 6 Alabama State Department of Education's Division of 7 Administrative and Financial Support with evaluative input 8 from other Alabama State Department of Education advisory 9 personnel, including the State Superintendent of Education, as 10 appropriate. Grants may be awarded any time after July 1st so 11 schools can prepare for the new school year. Notwithstanding 12 the foregoing, the Alabama State Department of Education's 13 Division of Administrative and Financial Support shall make 14 every reasonable effort to notify grant recipients of awards by August 1, 2017. No funding will be available until October 15 16 1, 2017. Grantees will have no guarantee of funding until October 1, 2017. 17

18 Section 16. If any section, paragraph, sentence, 19 clause, provision or portion of this act or all or any portion 20 of the appropriations herein made is held unconstitutional or 21 invalid, it shall not affect any other section, paragraph, 22 sentence, clause, provision or portion of this act or any 23 other appropriation or appropriations or portion thereof 24 hereby made not in and of itself unconstitutional or invalid.

Section 17. All laws or parts of laws, general,
 special, private or local in conflict with or inconsistent
 with the provisions of this act are hereby expressly repealed.
 Section 18. This act shall become effective on
 October 1, 2017.
